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## From the Pastor ...

Dear RVCC members and friends,

We will already be one week into our Lenten season when you receive this newsletter. With Easter arriving this year, April 9th, does it mean spring will also be early? One can only hope!

Our Lenten study group is reading "Final Words from the Cross" by Adam Hamilton. The author devotes six chapters to Jesus' last words as he hung dying on the cross. Adam Hamilton writes: "A word about the order of the last statements of Jesus: Because no one Gospel includes more than three of the final seven phrases Jesus spoke, we do not know the exact order in which Jesus said these words during the six hours on the cross. I have in this book the traditional ordering of these statements:

"Father, forgive them; for they do not know what they are doing."

"Today, you will be with me in Paradise."

"Behold your son....Behold your mother."

"My God, my God, why have you forsaken me?"

"I thirst."

"It is finished."

"Into your hands, I commit my spirit."

Our Lenten study group will explore the meaning of Jesus' dying words for our lives today.

Since we are in winter, I want to share this well-known poem by Robert Frost:

#### Stopping by Woods on a Snowy Evening

Whose woods these are, I think I know. His house is in the village, though; He will not see me stopping here To watch his woods fill up with snow.

# Summary of February 9, 2023 Coordinating Council/Deacons Meeting

The meeting of Coordinating Council/Deacons was called to order at 6:10 PM on Thursday, February 9, 2023, by Tom Wiley. Present were Brenda, Rolf, Tom, Caryl, Deb and Judy.

Brenda offered the opening prayer. Tom reviewed the agenda.

**Treasurer Report:** Brenda reported that income was on target for the month of January, expenses were up slightly, possibly due to December bill being paid in January. There were no new pledges that came in, we have received a total of 24 pledges, two or those have been prepaid.

**Clerk:** nothing to report

**Trustees:** Rolf reported that we made it through the deep freeze weather with no major problems. But we ran out of oil again, our oil company did not put us on auto delivery as requested. We are now on auto delivery for sure. There were also no problems in the parsonage.

Missions: Caryl reported that \$250 had been given to Feed America, \$150 had gone to assist a local resident, \$250 had gone to Good Shepherd Food Bank, and \$250 had been sent to the UCC for disaster relief in Turkey and Syria. Caryl noted that she always pays processing fees when making a donation, if it is requested. Both the UCC and Good Shepherd did that. During February, we will be collecting personal items for the Raymond Food Pantry

**Christian Education:** Petra has picked a book for the Lenten Book Study, it is "Final Words from the Cross", by Adam Hamilton. The class starts on February 22, at 6:30 PM. Please let Petra know if you are interested, so she can order books.

**Deacons:** The Deacons are working on the service for this coming Sunday. It includes a pre recorded Spirit Spotlight and Sermon by Petra, plus recorded music from Michael. We will not have an Ash Wednesday service, Caryl will make available a list of services at other local churches.

**Old Business:** Tom reviewed the events of the Annual Meeting. He reminded us of a follow up meeting on March 5, in person, immediately following worship. In the meantime, on February 21, at 6:00 PM, we will have a zoom brain storming meeting with our Maine Conference Minister, Marisa Laviola, to discuss our options for after Petra leaves. At their meeting next

week, Caryl and the Deacons will work on an agenda for the meeting.

**New Business:** The subject of having a formal farewell service/reception for Petra was discussed. This is something we definitely want to do, possible dates were discussed. Caryl will follow up on this by speaking with Marcia Charles, who is the head of the Cumberland Association of the Maine Conference of the United Church of Christ. Caryl presented material which she has put together on possible supply pastors. We will also need someone for emergency pastoral coverage. It was felt that it should not be the same person. The deacons will discuss the list of supply pastors at their meeting on February 13. We will need someone for approximately 4 months, June through September. We discussed asking Chan Roach, Alice Oldford, and Bob Yates to be a committee to follow through with the process of selecting supply pastor. Council members were reminded about the zoom meeting on February 21 with Rev. Marisa Laviola. There was brief discussion about agenda for meeting with the congregation on March 5. Rolf expressed concern about discussing church rental potential. He feels we could advertise that we have rooms to rent for short term use, but has concerns about considering long term rentals to businesses for example.

Weathervane deadline is February 19, we will print on the 23<sup>rd</sup>. On Saturday, 2/25, at 3:00 PM, on zoom, we will have brief meeting to plan agenda for the March 5 meeting with the congregation. Our next regular council meeting will be Monday, March 13, on zoom.

## Minutes of 2023 Annual Congregational Meeting January 22, 2023

Note: These minutes are not official until adopted at the 2024 Annual Meeting

Moderator Tom Wiley called the meeting to order at approximately 11:15 PM. There were approximately nineteen people in attendance, two via zoom, the rest in person in the church.

Opening Remarks: Tom reflected on the challenges of the past year. We have a good team of council members and deacons, but it has not changed in a number of years. We need more help with the challenges that lie ahead. His opening prayer was from our Mission Statement. We pray that God will guide our deliberations. Ephesians 4:2 reminds us that we own and are responsible for our own thoughts. Caryl Gilman made a motion to accept the minutes of the 2022 Annual Meeting as printed. The motion was seconded by Bonnie Wiley and approved.

**Agenda Article 1:** Rolf Olsen made a motion to waive the reading of the reports of the coordinators, and to accept those reports. The motion was seconded by Nancy Yates and approved. Rolf Olsen also made a motion to take Article 3 out of order, seconded by Nancy Yates and approved.

**Agenda Article 3:** to elect a slate of officers and deacons for 2023:

Slate of Deacons for 2023: Caryl Gilman, Deb Feagans, Cora Sullivan, Tom Wiley and Nancy Yates.

Slate of Coordinators for 2023: Moderator-Tom Wiley, Treasurer-Brenda Olsen, Clerk-Judith Munson, Financial Secretary-Nancy Yates, Missions-Caryl Gilman, Christian Education-vacant, Trustees-Rolf Olsen, Stewardship-vacant. Tom Wiley asked for any nominations from the floor, there were none. Rolf Olsen made a motion, seconded by Caryl Gilman to accept the slate as moved, and to allow the council to fill any vacancies during the year. The motion was approved.

Agenda Article 2: Brenda Olsen presented the Treasurer's Report for 2022, and the Budget for 2023. The past year showed us with expenses under budget, mostly due to less spending for our pastor, although we also showed a big increase in utilities. Decrease in income was mostly due to losses in our invested funds. We lost \$15,659 in our American Funds, and withdrew \$39,484 from the American Funds. Missions remains one of our biggest funds, although we spent \$16,889 of Missions this year, we still show a balance of \$29,270 in that account. In the general fund we have \$33,000 left to

spend. The proposed budget for 2023 is similar to that of 2022, although there is an increase for utilities. For the Pastor expenses, we continue with expenses for Petra until June 1. We are then budgeting \$175 per Sunday for Supply Pastors for June through September, and then for a new Pastor at Petra's current rate for October through the end of the year. At the rate of spending in this proposed budget, we will have used our surplus by the end of 2024. There were a number of questions about the budget, but in order to move forward we need to pass this budget. Caryl Gilman made a motion, seconded by Bonnie Wiley to adopt the budget for 2023, as presented. The motion was approved.

**Agenda Article 4:** How to move forward knowing that our funds are limited is the big question. Council members and Deacons have identified 4 possibilities. Option A: Continue much the same as we are now, Petra is pastor until 6/1, then supply pastors until we hire a new pastor at same hours as Petra. Option B: Explore merging with another church after Petra retires on 6/1. Again, we would need supply pastors for a period of time while we explore details of a merger, and a congregational vote would be required. Option C: Go out with a bang, plan an ending for RVCC, on or after 6/1/2023. There is work to pull together celebrations and to plan what to do with RVCC assets. Option D: After Petra retires on 6/1, hire supply pastors, and arrange for ongoing pastoral care. Another possibility (Option E) would be to use a combination of supply pastors and lay leadership. In either case, we would need to guide Church Secretary and Pianist considering ever changing leadership. There were a number of questions and suggestions. Craig asked if we have to vote today, there is too much to take in and too many questions. Bonnie answered that we were looking for people's preferences today, not a binding vote, but an idea of the direction we would like to pursue. Anita asked about possibility of renting out part of the building to bring in income. Alice Oldford expressed her concern that having supply pastors for 4 months, from June through September is putting us on hold. Brenda pointed out once again that we need new and additional leadership. Cherie expressed concern that it might be hard to find a new pastor willing to take us on for only a short term. Petra reminded us that a Church is not about the building, it is about the people. Caryl's vision for us is to become a mission church, putting all our time and energy into helping others, not into the building. People were asked to fill out form

indicating their first, second and third choices. Of the 15 returns, 13 people indicated that B, merging with another church would be their first choice. It was decided to hold another meeting on March 5, after church, in person, that is not a zoom Sunday. The meeting was adjourned at 12:25 PM.

**Post Script**: not a part of the minutes: Tally of votes taken at meeting for Options of going forward:
Of the 15 returns, 13 of them had B for first choice
A had the highest number for second choice, with 6 votes
Only 4 votes for C, all as 3<sup>rd</sup> choice
Options D and E seemed similar to me, there were 15
votes for D and E, 7 of them for 2<sup>rd</sup> choice, 8 of them for 3<sup>rd</sup> choice.

#### Looking to the future, this year...

As Petra wrote in last month's Weathervane, her contract ends on 6/1 and she will not be able to continue with us beyond that date. We discussed this at annual meeting, along with discussing our current financial situation. Four+ options for our future were presented and attendees put them in priority order- first to thirds. The highest number of votes for first went to "explore merging with another church". The next highest number went to "hire another pastor and continue as today". Then we agreed to meet again after church on March 5th to discuss further. Lunch will be served.

After annual meeting, our conference minister Rev Dr Marisa Laviola offered to talk with us as she would like to help us. That meeting will be held February 21 via Zoom. The discussions at that meeting will be brought forward to the March 5<sup>th</sup> meeting.

Meanwhile, we decided to pursue pulpit supply for the summer, June 4<sup>th</sup> through September 3<sup>rd</sup> (14 Sundays). Four people are working on this: Caryl Gilman, Alice Oldford, Chan Roach and Bob Yates. The pulpit supply pastor will be asked to:

- Prepare Sunday worship service, including sermon, and deliver on Sunday.
- Sunday stay for coffee hour after worship (approx. 30 min)
- Provide content for worship bulletin to Church Secretary in a manner agreeable to both.

Chan Roach has already agreed to cover pastoral emergencies during this period of time. THANK YOU, Chan!
